Conference reflects increasing interest in animal welfare science

The popularity of their bi-annual conference on 'Recent advances in animal welfare science' and the quality of work presented reflect, say organisers the Universities Federation for Animal Welfare, the increasingly large number of people who are now devoting their energies to the science of animal welfare and improving our knowledge of the best ways to look after the animals in our care.

UFAW's sell-out conference was held June 30th at the Merchant Adventurers' Hall in York and saw animal welfare scientists, veterinary surgeons and others with an interest in the way we keep and care for animals gather to share the findings of their latest research with colleagues from the UK and around the world. A wide range of issues were addressed including new methods aimed at better assessing welfare and continuing widespread concerns about the welfare of layer and broiler chickens. Posters covered topics as diverse as the transportation of ornamental fish, assessment of the quality of life of kennelled dogs and the effects of stress in neonatal lambs.

Appropriately during the conference UFAW presented its annual Companion Animal Welfare Award and Wild Animal Welfare Award, both of which recognise innovations and advances for the welfare of animals. The UFAW 2010 Companion Animal Welfare Award was presented to PDSA's (Peoples' Dispensary for Sick Animals) Pet Health Team (including Senior Veterinary Surgeons Sean Wensley, Elaine Pendlebury and Timothy Browning) for their project 'Your Right Pet' – a web-based tool designed to help prospective pet owners choose the right pet for their lifestyle and circumstances. The site (www.your-right-pet.org.uk) gives information about the five welfare needs and practical guidance on how these can be met for commonly kept companion animals – helping to prevent the suffering that can be caused by inappropriate pet choice.

The UFAW 2010 Wild Animal Welfare Award was presented to the Food and Environment Research Agency (FERA)(Dr Julie Lane, Vicky Jackson, Anne Hudson and Matt Brash) in collaboration with the University of York (Dr Pat Coulson) for their new 'Wild mammal and bird training course'. As human pressures on the environment grow, there is increasing need for research into aspects of the ecology, control and conservation of wild animals, and the new course provides training for researchers aimed at improving best practice in the capture, handling, marking and release of wild animals used in such research.
