Tuesday 8 November 2022 at 14:00

Feast of the Saints and Martyrs of England

(In the calendar of the Church of England)

Introduction and Welcome from the Dean of Lichfield

This is a day of great rejoicing. Today, Lichfield Cathedral receives a relic of its copatron, Saint Chad. It will be housed in a new Shrine Altar. The relic and the reliquary are the generous gift of the Archdiocese and Saint Chad's Cathedral, Birmingham. We celebrate the esteem and affection we have for one another and our companionship in the inheritance of faith and godliness left to us by Saint Chad.

For our Cathedral this is a day of healing and rediscovery: all of us here acknowledge with sorrow and repentance the bitter and violent history that arose from the religious controversies of the sixteenth century and divided the church in this nation and throughout Europe. Many who contended for their beliefs, both Catholic and Protestant were martyred. We pay them homage today, in the Church of England calendar, the feast of the Saints and Martyrs of England. We meet today conscious of that history, but also aware that the Holy Spirit has led all our churches in an earnest quest for unity, taking to heart Our Saviour's prayer that his followers may be one as He and the Father are one. We give thanks for the decades of patient theological dialogue between our churches and the fruitful blessings it has brought forth in better understanding, trust, friendship and deep respect for one another. We delight in those personal and institutional friendships that have blossomed at every level, especially those made by successive Popes and Archbishops of Canterbury.

For Lichfield Cathedral we retrieve, and set forth in a new way, the devotional focus of this Cathedral. Shortly after Saint Chad's burial in the Church of Saint Peter pilgrims came to seek healing and forgiveness at Saint Chad's tomb. Although the mediaeval shrine was destroyed the memory of what it meant has lived on. The Cathedral was configured to lead people to the place where the shrine was sited. Today, we reinstate that spiritual focus. We pray for a share in Saint Chad's Christlikeness. We recall his humility in helping to bring a divided church together, his approachability and his love for people, his compassion, zeal and prayerfulness. We ask Our Lord to use this space to draw people to Himself where each may find healing and renewal. We pray that this space may be a waymark in our search for Christian unity and that compassion and mercy may well up in the hearts of all who come here.

We also pray that just as Saint Chad served the Lord with joy and obedience, so this Shrine may remind us of our calling and task to teach, preach, heal and reconcile and that those ministries may find a focus here.

The Saints of God belong to us all because they witness to Christ who is Lord of us all. Let us worship in the joy of their fellowship and in the light and peace of Jesus Christ, crucified, risen, ascended, our morning star, our one true light.

The Dean of Lichfield welcomes the congregation and introduces the service:

Dear Friends in Christ, you are welcome in this Cathedral Church dedicated to St Mary, the mother of Jesus, Theotokos, the God bearer, and to St Chad, first Bishop of Lichfield, whose zeal and devotion won many hearts for Jesus Christ. Today we give thanks for the gifts of the Holy Spirit which have brought divided Christians into a recognition of what we have in common and the grace to discern the face of Christ in each others' faith and discipleship.

Above all, as Jesus called his disciples "friends", so we give thanks that his spirit of charity and love enables us to enjoy that gift of friendship, that movement of the heart which draws God's people together and renews our quest to be one.

We give thanks that the path to the unity we all seek brings us here, the place where St Chad was buried and where devotion to him was first established. We pray that here and in St Chad's Cathedral and Basilica in Birmingham our common legacy in the life of a humble, courageous and Christ-like Bishop may encourage us on our pilgrimage as we seek God's kingdom and his righteous will on earth.

This text is inscribed upon the Pugin casket containing the relics of Saint Chad at Saint Chad's Cathedral, Birmingham.

The Revd Canon Gregory Platten, Canon Chancellor, Mrs Susan Hannam, Head Teacher of Lichfield Cathedral School and Dr Margaret Masson, Principal of Saint Chad's College, University of Durham, read

The death and early devotion to Saint Chad according to Bede.

"Chad established his episcopal seat in the town of Lichfield, where he also died and was buried, and where the succeeding bishops of the province have their see to this day. There he built himself a house near the church, where he used to retire privately with seven or eight brethren in order to pray or study whenever his work and preaching permitted. When he had ruled the church of the province with great success for two and a half years, divine providence ordained a time such as is spoken of in Ecclesiastes:

"There is a time to cast away stones and a time to gather stones together". For heaven sent a plague which, bringing bodily death, bore away the living stones of the Church from their earthly stations to the temple in heaven.

... Owini was working outside and the other brethren had departed to the church, the bishop was reading and praying alone in his oratory. Suddenly, as he used afterwards to relate, he heard the sound of sweet and joyful singing coming down from heaven to earth...Owini stood astonished for a while, turning over in his mind what this might portend..." Father, I beg you to let me ask you a question." "Ask what you wish," Chad replied. "Tell me, I pray," he asked, "what was the glad song that I heard of singers coming down from heaven upon this oratory and later returning to heaven?" "Since you heard the singing and were aware of the coming of the heavenly company," Chad answered, "I command you in the name of our Lord not to tell anyone of this before my death. The truth is that they were angelic spirits, who came to summon me to the heavenly reward that I have always hoped and longed for, and they promised to return in seven days and take me with them." All took place as he had been told: for Chad was quickly attacked by a disease which steadily grew worse until the seventh day. Then he prepared for death by receiving the Body and Blood of our Lord, his holy soul was released from the prison-house of the body and, one may rightly believe, was taken by the angels to the joys of heaven. Nor is it strange that he regarded death with joy as the Day of the Lord; for he had always been careful to prepare for his coming.

...Chad died on the second of March (672) and was first buried close by Saint Mary's church; but when a church of the most blessed Peter, Prince of the Apostles, was built there later, his body was transferred to it. In both of these places, frequent miracles of healing attested to his virtues. More recently, a madman wandering at large arrived there one evening, and passed the night in church unnoticed and unheeded by the watchmen. And in the morning, to the amazement and delight of all, he left the place in his right mind, showing clearly what healing he had been granted there by the goodness of God. Chad's burial place is covered by a wooden tomb made in the form of a little house with an aperture in the wall through which those who visit it out of devotion may insert their hand and take out some of the dust. They mix this in water and give it to sick men or beasts to drink, by which means their ailment is quickly relieved and they are restored to the longed for joys of health."

The Reception of the Relic

As the combined choirs sing the anthem 'Christ is the Morning Star' by Arvo Pärt, the Dean of Saint Chad's Cathedral, accompanied by cross and lights, carries the reliquary from its place of rest to the new Altar. He is met by the Dean and Chapter of Lichfield Cathedral.

Christ is the morning star, who, when the night of this world is past, gives to his saints the promise of the light of life and opens everlasting day.

These words are inscribed on the new Shrine Altar.

When the Dean of Saint Chad's Cathedral arrives at the Shrine Altar, the corona is illuminated.

The Dean of Saint Chad's says

Receive this relic of Saint Chad which we bring to the place of his burial, the site of the earliest devotion to his memory.

Pray for us as we pray for you, that the Lord may give us all joy and hope in believing and give us the gift of the unity he wills.

The Dean of Lichfield, receiving the reliquary, says

We accept this gracious gift.

May it ever move our hearts and minds
to dwell on the many signs of God's mercy,
and help us to follow the way of devotion and faith that Saint Chad lived.

May it draw us into steadfast prayer
to live and work to God's praise and glory,
and walk together the path that leads
to the unity and peace of all God's people.

He passes the reliquary to the Bishop of Lichfield, who places it in the Shrine Altar.

An organ fanfare is sounded.

Stand as the Choirs sing the Song of Mary - The Magnificat, during which the Shrine Altar is censed, together with the clergy and people. Children from Birmingham and Lichfield lay flowers around the Shrine Altar.
